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The RUTH MARIE ~ A Father's Legacy

Karl Reichert of Minneapolis, MN, made his father's dream his own when he took over the build of the late patriarch's sternwheel houseboat, the RUTH MARIE. Karl's father, Donn, had always been fond of life on the water – he'd owned a couple of sailboats and loved sailing – but his wife, Ruth, didn't quite share in his enthusiasm. So, upon retirement, Donn decided he would turn his focus to river houseboating, hoping to explore the Mississippi and Ohio rivers with Ruth on a more comfortable style of watercraft. He also chose to make his beloved wife the namesake of his creation.

Donn used his machine shop on the family farm to construct the hull, which is 37' long x 12' wide, and began welding in 2003, using his knowledge of engineering to calculate water displacement. He meticulously notated the weight of every section of steel, and within a year, had the entire hull constructed; an impressive feat for a 68-year-old man undergoing treatment for prostate cancer. Donn also started mapping out the maiden voyage that would carry he and Ruth down the Mississippi River to Cairo, IL, and then up the Ohio River.

In the years that followed, Donn would install the diesel engine, fuel tank, and drivetrain, and he built out the first floor which included the galley and bathroom. While work progressed, life "happened" (as it always does), and Donn was eventually drawn back into the family business. Additionally, he took on the role of caregiver as Ruth faced surgery and chemotherapy for colon cancer in 2011.

While Donn's momentum for the project may have been put on pause, his desire to get the RUTH MARIE on the river never waned. It was during Donn's final months (at the height of the COVID pandemic), that Karl had the privilege of moving home to help his mother tend to his father. Mother and son spent many hours at the kitchen table talking about the boat, and those conversations became pivotal for Karl after his father's passing in 2021, inspiring him to carry out his father's legacy.

Karl, and his husband, Reynaldo, share a combined determination to finish the RUTH MARIE and make it a special home on the water. Rather than investing in a lake cabin or second residence, the boat will eventually become a place to spend time gathering with friends and family on the Mississippi, while being close to their condo in downtown Minneapolis. With space being a precious commodity on the vessel, the couple is trying to create a place of joy for those that come aboard, but also striving to maintain some ease of operation and modern-day convenience.

When Donn was creating the boat 20 years ago, everyone was young and nimble, so focusing on a staircase and railing, rather than a ladder to the second floor, will be a much better design for the couple when they approach their golden years.

HEAVY RAINS DELIVER TROUBLE TO RIVERS FOR WEEKS



We all know "April showers bring May flowers", but for the surrounding area, heavy rains brought rising water levels and flooding. The Point in Pittsburgh crested on April 4th at 28.37'; the last time it faced such a rise was March 12, 2011 at 26.65'. Further south, the Ohio River spilled over banks and onto roads in cities like Wheeling & Charleston in West Virginia, and Marietta & Pomeroy in Ohio. Sadly, the rainfall and storms affected roadways, vehicles, homes and businesses. On April 12th, more than two dozen barges broke loose on the Allegheny and floated down the Ohio with five going through the Emsworth Dam and four going over the Dashields Dam. One marina suffered extensive damage, and many docks are now in need of repair.

Not Your Usual Moving Day

The relocation of the floating house from Rayland, OH, to Glen Dale, WV, was an exciting endeavor. A whole lot of planning and preparation went into the project. There were many conversations with experienced captains, including ASA members Captain Bill Price and Captain Rick Burden. My advice to anyone speaking with seasoned pilots would be this: Be sure to listen and soak up every bit of knowledge offered.

To pull off the transfer of the house, we had a total of four vessels assisting: the Sternwheeler LADY CARMINA piloted by myself, the Sternwheeler SHAYLA ELIZABETH piloted by Captain Wil Windsheimer, and two smaller aluminum boats with outboards. There was much dialogue on how to rig the sternwheel boats to the house, and eventually it was decided the best configuration was to tie the boats together and center them across the back of the house. This arrangement offered the most control ... however, there was no visibility for the captains to see what was in front of them. So, in order to remedy that situation, four cameras were used to provide live video feed to both pilothouses, along with GPS and AIS. Additionally, crewmembers were outfitted with headsets, and stationed at the front of the house as "spotters".

A log a log

The morning of the move was cold with temperatures in the low 20s, and we found some of our lines were frozen making them difficult to manipulate. We also experienced some ice buildup on the stern of the boats from wheel spray. It gradually warmed throughout the day, and as the temperature rose, these issues thankfully subsided. And even though temps were chilly, the winds were actually favorable with predictions of a light breeze and minimal gusts.

Entering the big chamber at Pike Island was an intentionally slow and careful approach. The smaller outboard boats were used to keep the approach on point by providing nudges as needed. All went well from a maneuvering standpoint, and our expert crew was able to get lines on a floating pin with no issue.

Once out of the chamber, the remainder of the trip continued as planned. We made good time traveling at around 5mph with no struggle. I was surprised at how well we were able to push the house. We took our time and made the 17-mile journey, navigating the one lock at Pike Island, all in less than six hours total.

And speaking of timing, this trip definitely had a timetable because the move itself was dependent upon the schedule of the company that was setting new pilings to hold the house in position. Ideally, we wanted to be in our location one week prior to the company's arrival to avoid being vulnerable to high water and winds. Now, we did accomplish our goal and were able to arrive on time, but shortly thereafter, Mother Nature surprised us with record rainfall, winds and flooding. Thankfully we were capable of riding out the high water with the existing pilings, but it was certainly not a comfortable ride.


As you can see at right, the top photo shows the river flooded, prior to the poles being set for the house and debris wall. The bottom photo shows the river 4' above normal pool with the poles set in place for the dock, house and debris wall. Three poles were set to hold the floating house and three additional poles were set to hold a debris wall we are in the process of having put in place. Altogether, 60' of dock was added to the already placed 80' of dock. The poles were set by Marion Hill on April 9th by an amazing crew.

Thanks to our incredible team we managed a move that was anything but typical!

The Story Behind the Name



The **GRACIE L** was owned by Captain Donald & Grace Burden along with their three sons, Rick, Bob and Darryl, and their grandchildren.

The sternwheeler's name may have been inspired by Don's wife, Grace, but it was actually the captain himself who stirred up all the excitement. You see, Don sat along the banks of the river watching boats go by, *years before* he ever dreamt of building one and standing at the helm. And over time, as his love of boats grew, it became infectious; becoming the catalyst for the Burdens getting involved with sternwheel boats. It was also the inspiration for the family to build several more sternwheelers over the years.

The GRACIE L was eventually sold and

became known as the MICHAEL J for a short time. Sold again, the vessel would then become what is now well known on the sternwheel circuit as the FRANKY D. (As for stories behind those specific names, I guess we'll wait and see if they are revealed in a future newsletter!)
